

Main Speaker:


Dr. Byron R Johnson is the Distinguished Professor of the Social Sciences and Director of the Institute of Studies of Religion (ISR) as well as director of the Program on Prosocial Behavior, both at Baylor University. Before joining the faculty at Baylor University, Dr. Johnson directed research centers at Vanderbilt University and the University of Pennsylvania.



He is a leading authority on the scientific study of religion, the efficacy of faith-based organizations, and criminal justice. His recent publications have examined the impact of faith-based programs on recidivism reduction and prisoner reentry. Dr. Johnson and ISR colleagues are partnering with the Gallup Organization on studies addressing religion and spirituality of the world.
